Responding to distressed behaviours



One day

This course focusses on behaviour as a form of communication for people with dementia. It will equip you with the skills to understand why someone may be displaying distressed behaviour and ways to manage these situations.

Who's it for?


Anyone working or volunteering in the health or social care sector with existing knowledge and/or experience of supporting people with dementia.

Learning outcomes:

- To examine the link between damage to the brain caused by dementia and behaviour.
- To understand that a person with dementia may use whatever means possible to express themselves.
- To embrace new approaches to support people with dementia with complex needs, based on respect, compassion and empathy.

Course level: Intermediate.

Meaningful engagement with people living with dementia

Develop the knowledge and skills to meaningfully engage with people with dementia and improve their wellbeing.


Who's it for?

Anyone working or volunteering in the health or social care sector who is looking to gain greater understanding of how to plan and deliver activities for people living with dementia.

Supporting people with dementia and other vulnerabilities

- Learn how to tailor your approach to support people living with dementia more effectively.

Supporting people with dementia over the phone

Half dau

Learn how to confidently support people living with dementia and other vulnerable people over the phone.

Who's it for?

All customer-facing staff who interact with people over the phone.

Learning outcomes:

- Learn how to recognise when a person may be experiencing communication difficulties over the phone.
- · Skills in active listening and how to adapt your communication style to support vulnerable people.
- Identify strengths that people living with dementia retain in their speech and language.

Course level: Introductory.

Improving the customer experience for people with dementia

Half day

Customer-facing staff.

Learning outcomes:

- Learn how dementia may affect a person's ability to communicate and make decisions.

- Identify small changes that you can make to improve the experience of people with dementia who access your services.

Improving communication for people with dementia

Half day

We will identify how dementia can impact a person's ability to communicate and the additional challenges this creates.

Who's it for?

Anyone supporting people with dementia interested in knowing more about communicating with someone with the condition.

Learning outcomes:

- Identify the key elements of communication.
- Understand the barriers to effective communication.
- · List common communication errors.
- Explore how to enhance non-verbal communication.
- Be aware of the communication benefits of being non-judgemental.
- Demonstrate empathy skills.
- Know how to give effective feedback.

Course level: Intermediate.

Dementia and hearing loss

Half dau

This interactive course explores the link between dementia and hearing loss, the difficulties that people affected by both conditions may experience, and practical tips on how to support people.

Who's it for?

Health and social care sector looking to gain greater understanding of dementia and hearing loss.

Learning outcomes:

- Understand what dementia is, including the causes and symptoms.
- · Identify causes of hearing loss.
- · Learn how to recognise signs of dementia and hearing loss.
- Identify practical ways to support people living with dementia and hearing loss.

Course level: Introductory.

Supporting people with advanced dementia

Half day

Learn about the changes a person may experience as their dementia progresses, and how to confidently support a person in the later stages of dementia.

Who's it for?

Anyone working in health and social care supporting people in the later stages of dementia.

Learning outcomes:

- Learn to recognise when a person's dementia is becoming advanced.
- Gain the knowledge and skills needed to confidently plan care and support that will meet the needs of people in the later stages of dementia.
- Learn to identify ways of promoting wellbeing for people in the later stages of dementia.

Course level: Intermediate.

Understanding dementia and delirium

Half dau

Learners will find out about delirium including risk factors, the symptoms associated with the condition and how to support people experiencing delirium in social care settings. The course also explores the differences between dementia and delirium.

All staff working in primary or secondary healthcare settings.

Learning outcomes:

- Understand what delirium is, including the risk factors and symptoms.
- · Learn how to recognise delirium.
- Understand the relationship between delirium and dementia.
- Identify interventions that can help to manage delirium.
- Know how to help families and carers to understand delirium.

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End of life care for people with dementia

Half day

Improve your knowledge and understanding of end of life care for people with dementia and how to support a person to experience a good death.

Health and social care staff responsible for supporting people with dementia at the end of life.

- Gain an understanding of the bias that exists against different types of people, including race, gender, religion and sexual orientation.
- Understand how you can create an inclusive and fair space for people living with dementia.

Alzheimer's Society Dementia Training Courses

Understanding dementia

45 minutes

This course is designed to help you learn about dementia, including different forms of the disease and how the brain is affected. We will explore how dementia is diagnosed, risk factors as well as how dementia can affect day-to-day life.

Learning outcomes:

- · Understand what dementia is and how it affects
- Explore the risk factors to developing dementia and how the condition is diagnosed.
- Gain insight into what it is like to live with dementia, both for the person and those around them.
- · Understand how you can support people living with dementia.

Course level: Introductory.

Supporting customers with dementia



45 minutes

Learn how to provide outstanding customer service to people affected by dementia, including how to communicate with customers face-to-face and over the phone.

Learning outcomes:

- What dementia is and how to spot the signs and symptoms.
- Understand how the symptoms of dementia can affect a person's behaviour and communication.
- · Learn practical ways you can support people living with dementia in a customer-facing environment.

Understanding the early stages of dementia

- Understand the principles of person-centred care and support and how to apply them in practice.
- Learn ways to help people in the early stages of dementia to remain active.

Responding to distressed behaviours



45 minutes

This interactive course will help you to understand the link between our brain and our actions, and some of the mannerisms that you may see in people with dementia. Furthermore, you will learn how to identify the underlying causes of distressed behaviours and how to respond to these with empathy and respect.

Learning outcomes:

- Understand how dementia affects the brain so you can recognise when dementia is impacting somebody's behaviour, actions and/or emotions.
- Identify the types of behaviour a person with dementia may display.
- Understand the causes of distressed behaviours and the triggers to look for so you can provide practical support.

Course level: Intermediate.

Understanding the later stages of dementia



45 minutes

Learn how the symptoms experienced by people in the later stages of dementia can impact a person's experience of the world, their ability to communicate and their behaviours.

Learning outcomes:

- Identify the symptoms a person may experience in the later stages of dementia.
- Understand how the symptoms of advanced dementia can affect a person's behaviour and communication.
- Recognise how the later stages of dementia may impact a person's day-to-day life.
- Learn practical ways to support people in the later stages of dementia.

Course level: Introductory.

Supporting people in the later stages of dementia



45 minutes

Learn how to meaningfully engage with people in the later stages of dementia, including verbal and non-verbal communication techniques and activities to improve well-being.

Learning outcomes:

- Identify how the symptoms of advanced dementia can impact a person's ability to engage.
- Learn verbal and non-verbal communication skills to help you to positively interact with people in the later stages of dementia.
- Understand the principles of person-centred care and support and how to apply in practice.

Course level: Intermediate.

Learner – Understanding dementia





Supporting people with dementia at end of life



45 minutes

As someone with dementia reaches the end of their life, it is important that the person has input into their death and is able to contribute to the planning of it. This course is designed to help you recognise when someone with dementia is reaching the end of their life and the importance of planning for this time. You will learn how to support the person with dementia and those around them to experience a good death and know where they can go for further information and advice.

Learning outcomes:

- Understand why planning for end of life is important for everyone and the ways people living with dementia can be involved.
- Recognise the signs of end of life for someone with dementia.
- Identify barriers that people living with dementia might experience to achieving a good death and how you can overcome these.
- Know how to support the person with dementia and those around them during what can be a difficult time.

Course level: Advanced.

A guide to planning ahead



45 minutes

Learn about the importance of planning for the future following a diagnosis of dementia and ways that people living with dementia can plan ahead.

Learning outcomes:

- Identify practical ways that people living with dementia and their families can plan for the future.
- Learn how to facilitate conversations about planning for the future and how to support people with dementia to plan ahead.
- Identify some of the barriers that people may experience to planning for the future and how to overcome these.

Course level: Intermediate.

Bridging the gap between professional and family carers



45 minutes

Learn how to effectively support people living with dementia and their families through transitions of care, including involving people with dementia in decisionmaking and including family members as care partners.

Learning outcomes:

- Understand the importance of involving people living with dementia and their families in decisions about their care.
- Learn how to facilitate conversations about care with empathy and respect.
- Know how to support people with dementia and their families through transitions in care.
- Understand some of the challenges that people with dementia and their families may experience and how to overcome these.

Course level: Advanced.
